FIFTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE SOCIETY FOR INVERTEBRATE PATHOLOGY

MINNEAPOLIS, MINN., U.S.A., 27 AUG. - 1 SEPT.

Paper titles and abstracts are due now. Please use the forms which accompanied the Januari Newsletter. Papers are invited for all aspects of invertebrate pathology, and for the following special sessions: "Fungal Epizootiology," "Interactions of Insect Microbial Pathogens with Environmental Factors," "Immunity in Invertebrates," and "Microsporidia Symposium."

The Microsporidia Symposium will be entitled "Maintenance of microsporidia in the laboratory: methods and perspectives." The following topics will be embraced: methods of maintenance, colonization in laboratory animals, maintenance in organ and tissue culture, laboratory infection experiments, isolation, cleaning and storage of spores, and their effect on longevity, resistance, and physiology, cryopreservation, laboratory studies of life cycles, and methods of measuring, counting, etc. of spores.

INTERNATIONAL ORGANIZATION FOR BIOLOGICAL CONTROL.
WEST PALAEARTIC REGIONAL SECTION.

The 2nd. meeting of the Working Group for the Microbial Control of Lymantria dispar was held in Beograd, Yugoslavia, on September 9-12, 1971. Resolutions of this meeting contained o.a. the following points:

- Research should be done on the conservation of the virulence of stored polyhedra.
- Formulation of virus preparations for application on cork oak should be studied.
- Standardized bio-assay tests in laboratories should be continued.

Field experiments against L. dispar on cork oak will soon be carried out on Sardinia.

All papers presented at the meeting will be published in the Journal "Plant Protection Beograd". The next meeting of the working group is scheduled for September-October 1973 in Tempio Pausania on Sardinia.

BIOLOGICAL RESEARCH AT LEHIGH UNIVERSITY
DIRECTED AT ERADICATION OF SNAIL FEVER.

A group of scientists at Lehigh University (Bethlehem, Pennsylvania) carry out research which may lead to the eradication of the snail Biomphalaria glabrata, the vector of bilharziasis (snail fever). The work, which is done under the direction of Thomas C. Cheng, is sponsored by the International Copper Research Association. Main emphasis is laid on the study of the effectiveness of various copper compounds without endangering other organisms. Dr. Cheng's team also works on cross breeding of susceptible strains of the snails with non-susceptible strains in order to produce "a sort of molluscan mule, which will neither reproduce nor serve as a host to the parasite".

ADVANCE REGISTRATION INFORMATION

AIBS will accept advance registration applications until 15 August. After 15 August there will be a late registration fee of \$10.00 for regular registrations and \$5.00 for student registrations. In order to expedite registration and greatly reduce the inconvenience of registration processing on arrival, you are urged to preregister. AIBS will print a preliminary program which will be mailed only to those who preregister for the Meeting. The final program will not be mailed, but will be distributed at the time of final registration at the University of Minnesota.

REGISTRATION FEES.

- \$20.00 Advance registrations received by mail on or before 15 August.
- \$30.00 Late registrations received after 15 August by mail or at the meeting.
- \$ 5.00 Graduate or undergraduate students who register in advance by mail on or before 15 August.
- \$10.00 Graduate or undergraduate students who register after 15 August by mail or at the meeting.
- \$ 5.00 Spouse accompanying a registrant, not planning to attend scientific sessions.

REGISTRATION ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

AIBS will acknowledge all advance registrations received prior to 15 August. These acknowledgments must be presented upon arrival at the Registration Center which will be located in the Coffman Memorial Union.

REFUNDS

AIBS will refund "prepaid" advance registration fees on all cancellations received in writing or by telegram prior to 15 August. NO REFUNDS WILL BE MADE AFTER THIS DATE.

UNIVERSITY HOUSING AND MEAL INFORMATION

Housing and meals are available in several of the University's residence halls under two different plans which are listed below. Lounges, recreation rooms, laundry facilities, and vending rooms are available in each of the residence halls and convenient bath facilities are located on each floor. A limited number of air-conditioned rooms are available, and will be assigned on a first-come, first-served basis. In order to assure yourself of residence hall accommodations, you are urged to preregister at an early date. Other conference groups and Minnesota State Fair visitors will also be requesting housing during late August.

PLAN I Pre-Conference Housing. Room only accommodations. Nights of 22, 23, 24, 25, and 26 August for persons participating in pre-meeting field trips or conferences.

Middlebrook Hall - air-conditioned. Limited number, assigned on a first-come, first-served basis.

Single Occupancy - \$8.10 per person per night, plus tax.

Double Occupancy - \$7.10 per person, per night, plus tax.

Comstock and Sanford Halls - not air-conditioned.

Single Occupancy - \$7.10 per person per night, plus tax.

Double or Triple Occupancy - \$6.10 per person per night, plus tax

The above rates include bed linens, soap, towels, and telephone on a restricted toll and are subject to state and local sales taxes.

During the pre-conference days, 22-26 August, meals will be available in Middlebrook Hall at the regular guest rate, and individual meal tickets may be purchased at Middlebrook. Neither Comstock nor Sanford will be serving meals during the pre-conference period. The food service in Coffman Memorial Union will be open during its normal hours, and vending machines are available in Middlebrook, Comstock, and Sanford Halls.

PLAN II. Conference Housing. Room accommodations and breakfast only.

ASSIGNMENTS

Roommate requests will be honored only if individuals submit their advance housing applications at the same time to the University of Minnesota Housing Office.

OCCUPANCY

The residence halls do not have cribs or other special equipment for infants. Any person assigned a bed, which is the normal complement of the room, will be charged the rate as stated in both plans mentioned above. However, there will be no room charge for a child under 12 years of age if the parents provide their own crib or sleeping bag. Requests for children under 12 years of age to occupy the parents' room at no charge are limited to one request per family, and must be noted on the advance housing applications. Meals may be purchased separately for these children at the regular guest rate where available. There are a limited number of cots available for family use. Rates will be furnished upon request.

Early Arrivals.

Residence hall housing will be available on Tuesday, 22 August for persons participating in pre-meeting field trips or conferences. Due to the limited availability of single rooms, the University will assign these rooms on a first-come, first-served basis.

PAYMENT.

Prepayment of housing and meals will not be accepted. All charges will be collected at the residence hall check-in upon arrival.

There will be a minimum charge equivalent to two nights lodging.
